Unraveling Jerusalem's Armenian Experience: Reflections on History, Photography and Diaspora

Day 2

Symposium

September 21, 9:00

The Armenian community of Jerusalem has originated in the fourth century CE with Armenian pilgrims flowing into the Holy City after the adoption of Christianity. They have been subsequently united under the aegis of the Armenian Patriarchate of Jerusalem and settled within the Armenian Quarter in the Old City, playing an actively influential role in its development. This community thus stands out from the panoply of diaspora Armenian communities while certainly being part and parcel of its colorful mosaic.

The international symposium "Unraveling Jerusalem's Armenian Experience: Reflections on History, Photography and Diaspora" explores the singular Armenian presence in the intricate environment of the city of Jerusalem from Late Antiquity to the mid-20th century. An important and guite neglected aspect of the Armenian community has been the first local photographic practice established by the Armenian Patriarch Yessayi Garabedian in the 1860s, an event that has played a crucial role in the development of photography in the area for a century to come. Mediating between Muslim, Jewish and Christian communities, as well as Western residents, Armenian photographers have helped shape Jerusalem as an ecumenical space. As for the community more broadly, the religious, economic and educational ties that it has maintained with Armenians across imperial and cultural divides speaks of an

In response to this need, the symposium provides an interdisciplinary scholarly environment for reflecting on the Jerusalem Armenian community's role in the Holy City through photography and beyond. Scholars with a range of disciplinary backgrounds from Armenia, Hungary, Germany, UK, France, USA and Qatar will delve into the educational, institutional, visual and diasporic sides of the subject matter while also venturing into wider contexts. The symposium will be held in the same venue where the day before, the exhibition on the photographic heritage of the Armenian community of Jerusalem will be opened. In this way we hope the exhibition will create a radiant visual background for the scholarly discussions of the symposium.


